LAW DEPARTMENT EMBARKS ON P13 MILLION PROJECT

TO PROMOTE INCLUSIVE JUSTICE IN BOTSWANA

\ /ice Chancellor, Professor David Norris, has **V** thanked the US government for a close to P13 million (US\$117 000) grant which was given to the University of Botswana through the Department of Law under the Global Equity Fund.

The grant is part of a project named Promoting Inclusive Justice in Botswana whose aim is to strengthen training and understanding of judges and law students in LGBTI (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender) persons' rights. go out and defend the individual rights of Such will be achieved through development of a module on the rights of LGBTI persons for the Human Rights Course in the Department of Law, ensuring the inclusion of the Module in the Human Rights Curriculum and training the next generation of lawyers in LGBTI rights as well as establishing a LGBTI rights clinic within the UB Legal Clinic. In addition, there would be a Moot Court competition on LGBTI rights.

The project follows a partnership the Department into with International Association of Women Judges (IAWJ) and its Botswana Chapter in November 2020. Since commencement of the project 18 months ago, the department has conducted three human rights seminars during which students were trained on the Yogyakarta principles, a set of human rights imperatives for LGBTI people. Landmark on LGBT rights have also been discussed in addition to conducting two moot

court sessions. The third session is scheduled for April 2024.

Further, the department has received 11 clients at its Legal Clinic with various matters. Consequently, Professor Norris said as a free legal service which has assisted thousands of Batswana navigate their legal challenges, the clinic served as an important arm of legal training in Botswana.

"We are training these young lawyers to others," observed the Vice Chancellor, adding "I am encouraged to see that this grant has also impacted positively on our Legal Clinic through provision of equipment and supplies and through making it possible to assist members of the LGBTI community resolve their legal

Professor Norris was speaking at a Round Table on Promoting Inclusive Justice the University of Botswana Department of Law organised at the UB Campus Indoor Sports Centre on March 24, 2022. The Round Table was also attended by the US Ambassador to Botswana, Mr Craig Cloud who was invited to come and appreciate the various activities and experiences students had been engaged in.

Professor Norris said he was happy to see the Law Department seeking out opportunities for meaningful partnership that enabled students to extend their legal education and engage in legal problem solving. The Vice Chancellor added that he was also excited to learn that the IAWJ was keen to work with the University of Botswana on this groundbreaking project through its local chapter.

"We value these partnerships. I trust that this engagement will continue to bear fruit," noted Professor Norris underlining that the Promoting Inclusive Justice in Botswana project came at the most opportune time given that the rights of sexual minorities were currently some of the most challenging issues facing Batswana.

As such, he said this was the most ideal time to inform UB law students about such



developments and train the next generation of lawyers so that viewed human rights as indivisible and inalienable.

Industrial Court judge and IAWJ Botswana Chapter representative, Justice Annah Petje, said the aim of promoting inclusivity was to foster the capacity of the justice sector to protect the rights of the LGBTI community and prepare future generations in the legal profession to view LGBT rights within the human rights framework.

Justice Patje stated that even after Botswana courts pronounced on the rights of the LGBTI, they still faced constant discrimination hence the justice sector's response to such issues was critical in making social inclusion a reality for the LGBTI persons in Botswana. She also highlighted the need to raise awareness in the community to bring it on board on such issues. Justice Patje revealed that they had come up with a training manual for judges with input from a variety stakeholders to addresses critical issues facing LGBTI individuals in Botswana.

Head of the Department of Law, Dr Elizabeth Macharia-Mokobi, said the department was conducting human rights seminars for students through which learnt about recent case and legal developments on LGBTI issues. She said so far they had successfully trained two cohorts of 100 students each and the aim was to have

trained 300 students on LGBTI rights when the grant period ends.

Sharing their experiences, Ms Keatleretse Sebeso, a fourth-year law student, underscored the importance of laws that fostered equality, universality and non-discrimination for all while Ms Basetsana Salani, fifth year law student, said research showed no support for the LGBTI given that same sex was criminalized in Botswana. As such, there was still a long way to go, she added. Sharing his experience at the LGBTI Clinic, Mr Ame Pelekekae, highlighted how difficult it was for individuals to change their gender marker. Not only was it expensive in private health facilities but Mr Pelekekae lamented that it was also a hurdle in public sector as a result of complex administrative procedures.

US Ambassador to Botswana, Mr Craig Cloud, said his attitudes towards the rights of the LGBTI community changed gradually with time, noting that was how things generally evolved in life. He said the new generation bore a huge responsibility of liberating minorities. He expressed optimism and delight at the way both the students and UB Legal Clinic in pursued human rights issues.

BOU CHANCELLOR URGES RESEARCHERS TO SHARE FINDINGS WITH GOVERNMENT



Botswana Open University (BOU) Chancellor, Professor Sheila Tlou, has advised researchers to always share their research findings with government and other stakeholders.

Professor Tlou shared this during her visit to the Okavango Research Institute (ORI). She was accompanied by BOU Vice Chancellor, Dr Daniel Tau. She emphasised the need for collaboration between ORI and BOU.

Professor Tlou further highlighted the need for a research informed policy making process.

She called upon ORI and BOU researchers to make sure decision makers constantly received information.

He noted that from the local part, Dr Tau highlighted the local the University of Botswana and the University of Bo

In addition, Professor Tlou encouraged researchers not to aim at making their research

findings available in journals only but to make sure they disseminated them in local newspapers that everyone read as well. Another critical area that Professor Tlou said Botswana should cater for was research funding.

She was keen on tropical diseases in that she would like to see ORI involved in research that aimed at eradication of diseases such as malaria, bilharzia as well as HIV/AIDS. For his part, Dr Tau highlighted the long history that the University of Botswana and BOU shared hence the need for collaborative research between the two institutions.

He noted that from the onset, BOU had involved UB staff in some of its key committees such as that of the Appointment

and Promotion of Academic staff. He also noted that BOU and ORI had developed a joint graduate programme on Climate Change which would involve collaboration of the two institutions on supervision of students.

Meanwhile, Professor Tlou and Dr Tau were taken on a guided tour of ORI during which they expressed gratitude for having been welcomed at ORI.

On the other hand, Ori Director, Professor Joseph Mbaiwa, said he also felt honoured to have hosted such a high-powered BOU delegation. Professor Mbaiwa shared with the delegation a brief history of ORI and it's mandate.

South Korea's Ambassador to South Africa, Mr Chull-joo Park, on March 16, 2022 visited the King Sejong Institute at the University of Botswana. King Sejong Institute was officially opened in October 2018 as part of efforts to promote Korean culture in Botswana as well as to offer short courses in Korean language.

Welcoming the Ambassador, Dr Thulaganyo Mogobe, explained the impact the Korean culture and media has had on Batswana youth which he said had become part and parcel of their daily routine besides cultural artifacts such as pop culture music, drama and telenovelas that are regularly broadcast on Botswana Television.

Dr Mogobe further revealed that prior to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, 45 students had enrolled at the King Sejong Institute to study Korean language and culture.

In response, Mr Chull-joo Park expressed the desire for more Batswana to visit and experience Korea either as tourists, students or researchers. He observed that the University of Botswana could in collaboration with the embassy organise seminars either in Botswana or Korea for the benefit of both countries in a

number of areas of mutual interests.

Mr Chull-joo Park said were the Korean course at the University of Botswana could become an accredited programme, it could open doors for many Batswana especially on exchange programmes, scholarships and employment in Korea. He added that such an opportunity also had the potential to trigger investment and trade between Korea and Botswana.

Vice Chancellor, Professor David Norris, said during his recent visit to South Korea, he established some student exchange programmes. Professor Norris added that it would be of great benefit to students if the Korean language course at the University of Botswana were to become an accredited programme.

Regarding the proposition for seminars, Professor Norris welcomed the idea, noting that partnerships and collaborations were critical to the advancement of the university. He acknowledged the impactful contributions that Korean universities have had on their country's economic growth which could promote prospects more collaborations.

Also present at the event were Faculty of Humanities Dean, Professor Fidelis Nkomazana and Deputy Dean, Professor Thapelo Otlogetswe.

The UBHPC has been established as a regional destination of choice for all-round human and sports performance. Located within a multifunctional University of Botswana Indoor Sports Centre, the Centre is home to some of the world's leading experts and boasts state-of-the-art equipment.

Having played host to the men's 4x4m Tokyo 2020 Bronze medalists, the UBHPC also boasts a 3 418-seater arena, performance laboratories tailored to conduct tests specific to muscular endurance and strength, power, agility, aerobics as well as anaerobic endurance, speed, acceleration, bio-mechanical analysis

and psychomotor.

In addition, the UBHPC offers ancillary consulting services to corporate entities on work-related fitness, rehabilitation, injury prevention, health and wellness activities, and sport event management.
